If you want to be friends with him, go to page #4.

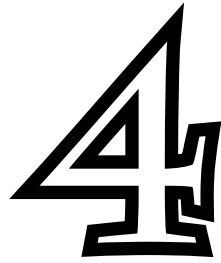
If you decide not to invite him back, go to page #5.
